

New Lunt's Comedy to Open Here Dec. 31

Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne will bring their London comedy hit "O, Mistress Mine" to the Wisconsin Union theater for a full week's run starting New Year's Eve, Dec. 31 and ending with a matinee

and night performance on Jan. 5. The Union theater committee is sponsoring their Madison appearances.

Mail orders will be accepted starting Monday by the Union theater.

"O, Mistress Mine" is the 26th play in which the Lunts appeared together and the fourth they have brought to the Union theater. In 1939 they opened the new million dollar theater with "The Taming of the Shrew"; in 1941 they played Sherwood's "There Shall Be No Night"; in 1942 they staged the world premiere of "The Pirate".

The Lunts have been in London since December, 1943, playing Sherwood's "There Shall Be No Night" through the buzz-bomb era.

"O, Mistress Mine" begins its pre-Broadway tour in Toledo, O., on Dec. 20, followed by a week in Milwaukee, a week in Madison and two weeks in Washington. The New York opening is scheduled for the week of Jan. 21.

Lunt is directing the show. The cast will include Dickie Patten, Margery Maude, Ann Lee, Marie Paxton, and Esther Mitchell.

The mail order period will continue until Dec. 22. If any tickets remain at that time they will go on boxoffice sale at noon Dec. 28.

'Winterset' to Feature Original Score

Innovations in light, setting, and music—including an especially written original score—will highlight the Wisconsin Players' production of Maxwell Anderson's "Winterset" in the Wisconsin Union theater Dec. 12-15.

Music will be treated not as a melodic background but as a psychological tonal instrument, according to John E. Dietrich, director of the play and associate director of the Players.

Don Voegel, musical director of WHA, has written the score and will play it on the Wisconsin Union's new organ. Sitting out of the audience's view, he will integrate his music with every move and sound on the stage. Sound sources for the music will be set so as to diffuse the tone.

Experimental lighting, based on the work of Gordon Craig, pioneer in theater lighting, and Adolf Appia, famed German scenic and lighting specialist, will be used.

The non-realistic settings will use a distorted perspective to present the play's emotional connotation.

Tickets are available for the Wednesday night performance which has just been added to the originally scheduled performances.

Helen Traubel Concerts Open Tuesday

Helen Traubel, soprano star of the Metropolitan Opera, will be presented in concerts Tuesday and Wednesday and two capacity audiences at the Wisconsin Union theater, Mrs. Traubel, who was forced to postpone the concerts originally scheduled for Nov. 16 and 17 by the illness of her husband, comes here just one week after opening the Metropolitan Opera season in New York with the singing of Lohengrin's Elsa.

Favorite of those attending the formal reception at the opening of the salon, the picture has continued to be tops in the popularity vote taken at the salon on display in the galleries of the Memorial Union from Nov. 8 to Dec. 3.

Griley, a former navigator of a B-17 who has returned to the University of Wisconsin to teach drawing, was awarded the Milwaukee Journal purchase award of \$100 for his "Shirley and Marionettes."
