Her short course in clairvoyance—the Madame is booked to appear at a Navy Relief bazaar, which Mrs. Jo Amley, a wealthy young widow, is giving—includes one "spirit" message for Brad Cavanaugh (Ray Milland), young attorney who represents Mrs. Amley (Virginia F.
